Across our state and nation, we continue to face tremendous challenges and disruptions. I know and recognize many of these issues stir strong feelings. While we may not always agree on how to handle these challenges, I remain hopeful we can commit to a return to civility and understanding toward one another.

Amidst the struggles and difficulties of the pandemic, we cannot lose sight of the fact that our children are watching and learning from our behavior. For the sake of generations to come, we must all look inward, reflect on our own actions, and ask ourselves whether we are setting the example we want our children to follow.

Universal pre-kindergarten

A anticipates that the Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK) program for our preschool children will continue into the 2022-23 school year. Children born on or before December 1, 2018 are eligible to apply for attendance in the program. Children who are eligible to attend kindergarten are not eligible to apply for attendance in UPK.

The application is included on pages 5-6 in this newsletter and will be available at the Elementary Office and on the district website at <u>www.aacsapps.com</u>. If you would like to receive an application in the mail, please call Heidi Putnam at 607-276-6530 or email <u>hputnam@aacsapps.</u> <u>com</u>. Completed applications and a copy of your child's birth certificate, current physical and immunization records are due at the Elementary Office by Wednesday, May 4.

Applications received after this date will not be considered if more than 18 applications are received. A random selection process, as required by New York State, will be performed should the district receive more applications than the 18 available openings. Families will be notified whether their child did or did not receive a spot in the UPK program with letters mailed on Monday, May 9.
