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A message from the Superintendent

November is a beautiful time of year filled with opportunities to show gratitude, appreciation and kindness. This month, we celebrate our Veterans on November 10, World Kindness Day on November 13 and Thanksgiving on November 23. Veterans Day is a celebration to honor all of America's Veterans for their patriotism, love of their country and willingness to serve and sacrifice. It is also a day for reflection and remembering. I would like to recognize and thank all of our Veterans for their service to our country. In recognition of Veterans Day, no school will be held on Friday, November 10.

We are excited to announce the opening of our new S.O.A.R. low ropes course and teaching center this fall! The S.O.A.R. course is a fun and challenging way for students and faculty/staff of all ages and abilities to learn about teamwork, problem-solving and leadership.

The course consists of a series of interconnected elements that participants must navigate together. These elements challenge participants to work together to overcome obstacles, communicate effectively and support each other.

The S.O.A.R. course is an excellent activity for groups, classes and teams of all sizes. It is also a valuable tool for team building and leadership development.

Some of the benefits of participating in the low ropes course are:

- Improved communication and teamwork skills: Participants must work together to complete the course, which helps them to develop their communication and teamwork skills.
- Increased problem-solving skills: The course presents participants with a variety of challenges that they must solve together. This helps them to develop their problem-solving skills and learn to think creatively.
 - Enhanced leadership skills: Participants have the opportunity to practice their leadership skills by encouraging and supporting their teammates.
- Increased self-confidence: As participants complete the course, they develop a sense of self-confidence and accomplishment.

The S.O.A.R. low ropes course is only open for school district use. Unauthorized use and trespassing is prohibited.

School safety remains very important to all of us, and we continue to ask for your help and support in keeping our campus safe. We require all visitors to enter the school through the main entrances of the buildings. Be sure to have a valid ID when entering our facilities. Visitors, staff and students are reminded to close doors and encouraged to report any behavior or conditions that may be observed as threatening. In the year ahead, we will practice fire, lock down and emergency go home drills. Before the first lock down drill, we will discuss the protocol and purpose with students. We ask that you reinforce the purpose of all drills and encourage children to take them seriously.

The week of October 16-20 was School Board Appreciation Week. A special thank you goes out to our five school board members, who collectively have more than 50 years of experience serving our district.

Cafeteria update

It has been a pleasure seeing the enthusiasm they each bring to their roles and the care they put into preparing meals for our students.

Much has taken place behind the scenes, including processing of free and reduced meal applications. Thank you to the families who have submitted applications to date. Families whose income changes and/or have not yet submitted an application are strongly encouraged to do so. Applications are processed all year and can be downloaded on the website: <u>https://alfredalmondcafeteria.gstboces.org/</u> or requested by calling the cafeteria at 607-276-6550. Please note that students qualified for free meals must take a complete meal in order to receive it at no charge. If a full meal is not taken, items are charged at a la carte prices.

If you haven't viewed the menus lately, take a moment to see what's cooking in the cafeteria. A number of wholesome, scratch-based meals are offered, such as macaroni and cheese, baked ziti and tacos. For grades 5-12, we also offer made-to-order wraps/subs three times per week and feature a salad bar daily with fresh veggies and housemade dressings. We also feature a rotation of specialty chicken sandwiches and cheeseburgers for those looking for a break from the "norm"!
